How to become a Stephen Minister


A Stephen Minister is a caring Christian lay person who, on a one-to-one basis, listens, understands, accepts, and prays for and with a care receiver who is working through a crisis or tough time. A potential Stephen Minister will receive 50 hours of training, continue to meet twice a month for supervision and continuing education and make an initial commitment of two years. After training, the Stephen Minister will meet with an assigned care receiver an average of one hour per week.


Stephen Ministry began in 1975 when Dr. Kenneth C. Haugh, a pastor and clinical psychologist in St. Louis, Missouri, trained parishioners to help meet the needs for care in his congregation. The ministry was so successful that other congregations became interested, and Haugh founded the Stephen Ministries organization. Since then more than 10,000 congregations have become involved in Stephen Ministry. They represent over 150 Christian denominations and come from all 50 states, 10 Canadian provinces, and 21 other countries.



About the Stephen Ministry logo

The Stephen Ministry logo is intended to convey what Stephen Ministry is all about. The logo consists of a cross and circle together with a broken person and a whole person. The logo's most dominant feature is the cross of Jesus. It reminds us that Christ is at the center of Stephen Ministry and all Stephen Ministry relationships.

The broken person behind the cross symbolizes the brokenness in our lives, a person in need of healing, a person in need of Christ's love and care. The whole person, a person who has received the love and care of Jesus. stands in front of the cross because it is only through the cross of Jesus that we are made whole. The circle symbolizes both the wholeness we receive through Christ and God's unending love for us. God's love surrounds us, holds us, heals us, with the cross of Jesus at the center of that love. The logo is designed to show that the path from brokenness to greater wholeness is through Jesus Christ and the ministry of Christ's people, including the ministry of Stephen Ministers. "Christ caring for People through People."

- You find the pink slip inserted with what is now your final paycheck.
- Your family and friends have heard your story one too many times, but you still need to talk it out.

- Receive quality Christian care,
- Deepen their relationship with our Lord,
- Grow in their desire to participate in Christian community,
- Come to value ministry from another lay person, while continuing contact with the pastor.

Stephen Ministry enhances SPUMC's outreach by:

- Creating a caring ministry outreach, where many are offering God's love and care in intentional, systematic ways;
- Enabling our entire congregation to grow as a warm, loving, nurturing community, where people are cherished and cared for in Jesus Christ;
- Identifying our congregation to our community as a place where people's needs are taken seriously.

How Did Stephen Ministry Get Its Name?

Stephen Ministry was named after St. Stephen, the first lay person commissioned by the Apostles to provide caring ministry to those in need. (Acts 6)

About the Leaders of SPUMC's Stephen Ministry

Stephen Leaders are pastors, church staff, and volunteers who have completed the Stephen Series Leader's Training, and are commissioned to our congregation.

In Galatians 6, Paul tells us to "carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ." At SPUMC our Stephen Ministers have been trained and organized to do just that.
